OVERVIEW

Founded in 2010 by brothers Muhammad Saud and Nadeem Shehzad, Wildlife Rescue is a charitable trust that works exclusively for raptor conservation and the protection of urban wildlife. The pioneering organisation currently operates a rehabilitation centre in Wazirabad, Delhi, catering to the large volume of wildlife that thrives in Delhi and its environs. In addition to its treatment facility and aviaries, Wildlife Rescue responds to distress calls from the Police, Fire Department, Veterinary Hospitals, and Government bodies, tending to urban wildlife in distress.

Wildlife Rescue was registered as a charitable trust in March 2010 under provisions of the Indian Trusts Act, 1882 and recognised as a charitable trust under Sec 12(A) & 80(G) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 in 2012. In the year 2020, Wildlife Rescue got registered with the Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India in FCRA Laws.

Wildlife Rescue has also received permission from the Department of Forests and Wildlife, Government of NCT of Delhi to rescue, treat and rehabilitate wild birds.

The Wildlife Rescue's team also coordinates daily with other veterinary hospitals in Delhi, bringing injured wildlife to their rescue facility. The organisation also sometimes treats snakes, reptiles, and other protected wildlife, in addition to raptors. Animals receive necessary medical check-ups, surgical procedures if needed, and are fed and cared for until they are ready for release. Once our veterinarian declares an animal fit for release, Wildlife Rescue works with the Department of Forest and Wildlife, Govt. of Delhi's staff to release the animal in their suitable habitat.



As glass-coated kite threads (Manjha) are the biggest threat to birds in Delhi, a large number of cases involve birds with injured muscles, tendons and bones. The Wildlife Rescue team has developed a novel technique to repair wings, ensuring that the bird retains its flying ability.

As our world continues to urbanise at a rapid rate, human - wildlife interactions are bound to increase. Wildlife Rescue also tries to mitigate the human wildlife conflicts which arises.

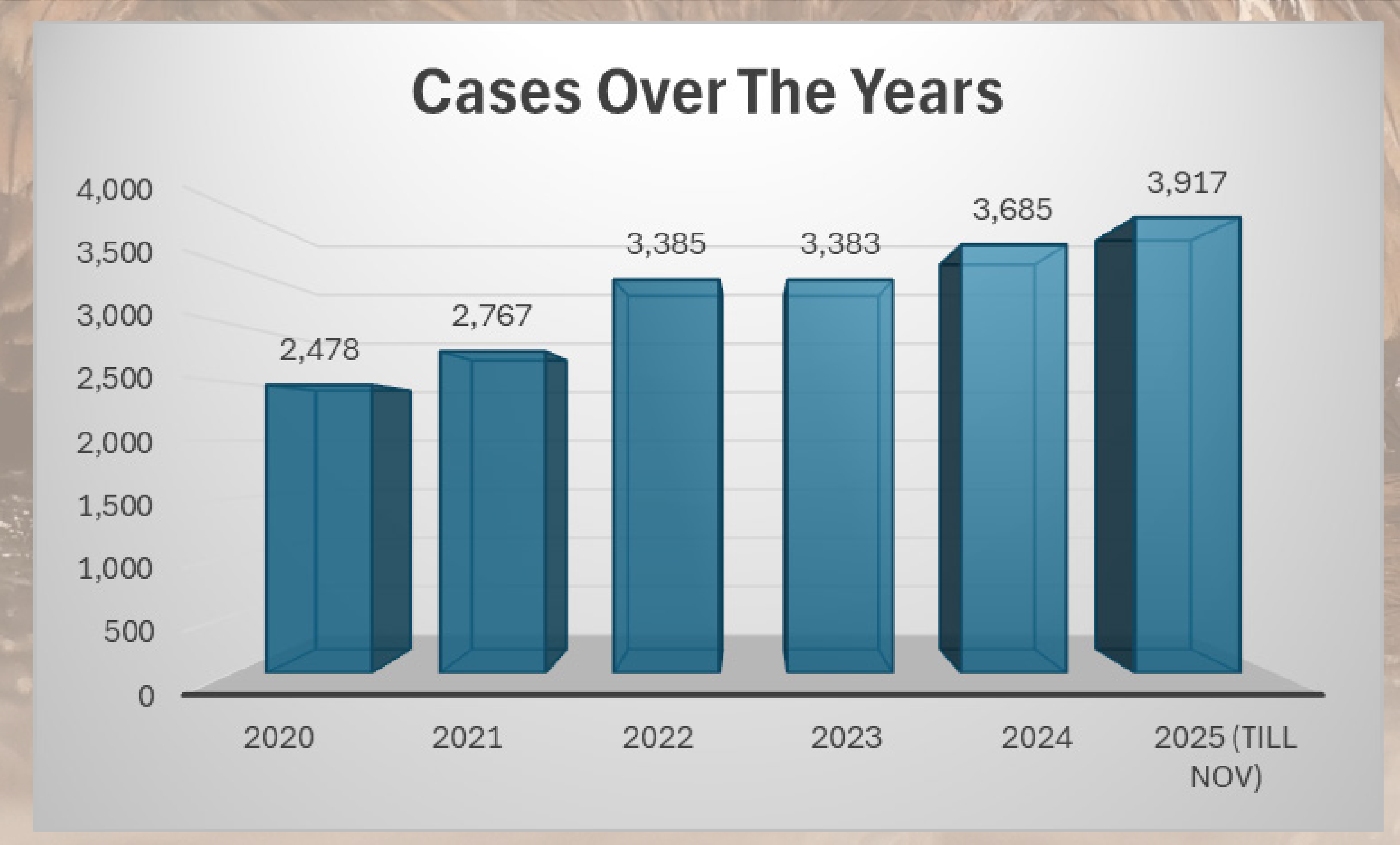

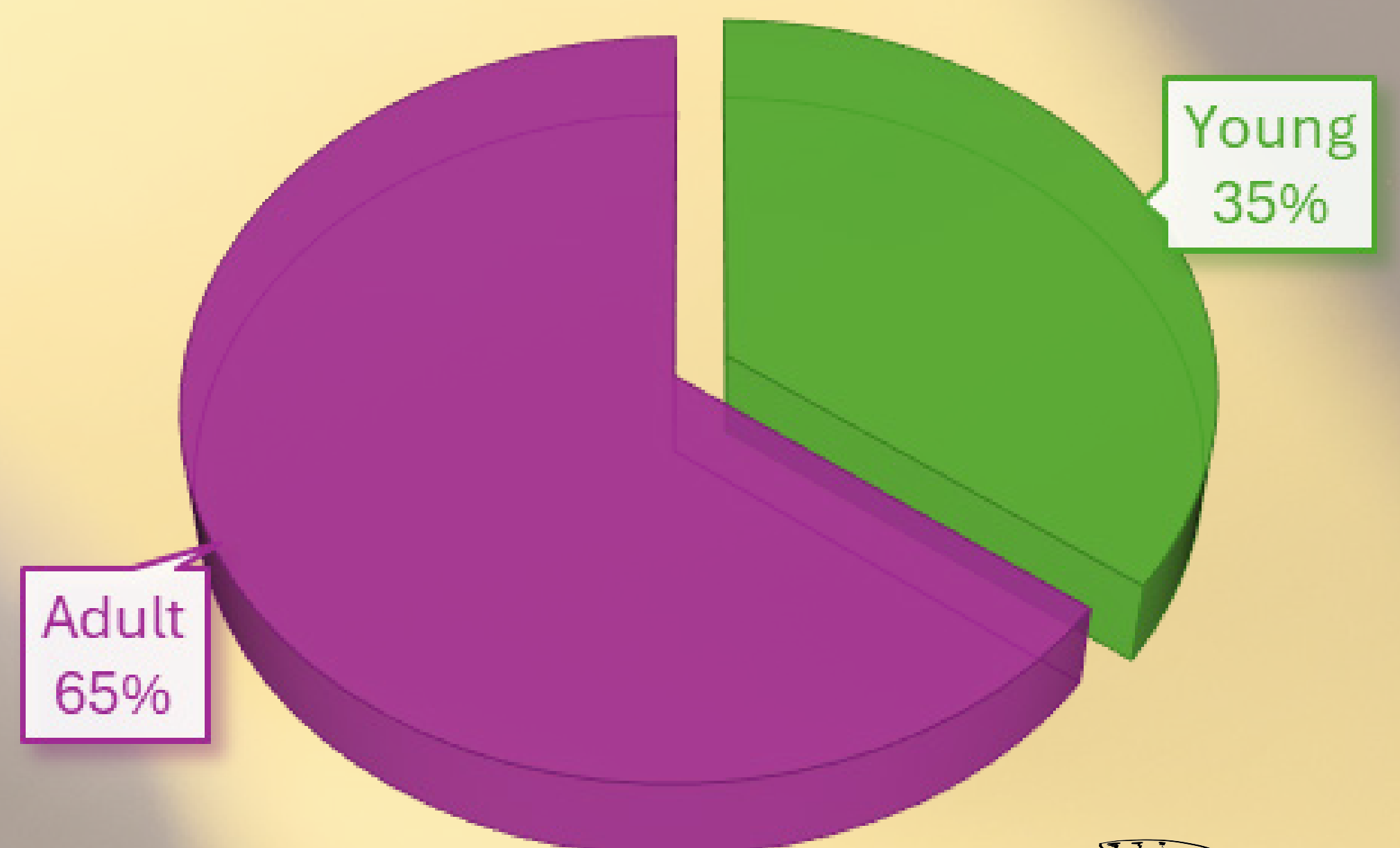
